
Trees' worth can't be measured



We were happy to read in a recent Arizona Republic article about the system the employees of the Phoenix Parks, Recreation and Library Department use to have a constant supply of trees for use in parks and city streets. The article stated, "Trees provide shade, cleaner air and offer a beauty you can't find without them."

When we consider that 35 million tons of dust-

pollutants in the air. Trees do have a cleansing effect on the atmosphere. According to the American Association of Nurserymen, trees and other green-growing natural materials help to filter

falling dust and other pollutants by capturing foreign particles in their leaves.

Following is a dollars and cents breakdown of the value of a tree taken from a newspaper in Portland, Ore. A tree allowed to grow for 50 years is worth over \$150,000. During this 50 years, it produces \$62,500 in air pollution control; \$37,500 in water recycling and humidity control; \$31,250 worth of oxygen and the same amount in soil benefits and wildlife shelter; and \$2,500 for food for wildlife in the form of protein taken from leaves and bark.
